SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

Currently in the field of Speech-Language Pathology, universal standards for swallow evaluation terminology, measurement, and reporting methods *do not exist*. For the first time, the MBSImP provides the means for clinicians to communicate MBS study results in an evidence-based manner that is consistent, specific, and accurate.

JoAnne Robbins, PhD, CCC-SLP, BRS-S, is an internationally known researcher, lecturer, author and inventor. She is a Professor in the Department of Medicine in the University of Wisconsin School of Medicine and Public Health, and she also serves as Associate Director of Research for the Geriatric Research, Education, and Clinical Center (GRECC) at the William S. Middleton Memorial Veterans Hospital. Dr. Robbins has over 20 years of experience in treating dysphagic patients. Her work is known worldwide and published in numerous international and national peer-reviewed journals. She also is coauthor of the Easy-To-Swallow, Easy-To-Chew Cookbook.



Christine Sapienza, PhD, CCC-SLP, is an author, international lecturer, and researcher focusing on normal and disordered speech and voice production in adult and pediatric populations. She is a professor and Chair of the Department of Speech, Language and Hearing Sciences at the University of Florida at Gainesville. She is also a Research Career Scientist with the Brain Rehabilitation Research Center at the Malcom Randall VA in Gainesville. Dr. Sapienza is an ASHA Fellow and author of Voice Disorders. She received her degrees at the University of Buffalo, including her PhD in 1993.



Bonnie Marlin-Harris, PhD, CCC-SLP, BRS-S, is an internationally renowned lecturer, researcher and clinician. She is the Founder and Director of the MUSC Evelyn Trammell Institute for Voice and Swallowing in Charleston, SC. Her latest research project was a rigorous, five-year MBS study testing whether a standard vernacular, protocol, evaluation measurement, and reporting method could be validly and reliably executed for the MBS. This study produced the Modified Barium Swallowing Impairment Profile (MBSImP).



Cathy L. Lazarus, PhD, CCC-SLP, BRS-S, is one of the premier researchers in the field of Speech-Language Pathology. She has conducted extensive research and lectured internationally for over 20 years on swallowing disorders in the head and neck cancer population. She is faculty at NYU School of Medicine, as well as Director of Research for the Thyroid Head and Neck Research Center at Beth Israel Medical Center in New York City.



Idnessa Humbert, **PhD**, **CCC-SLP**, is an Assistant Professor in the Department of Physical Medicine and Rehabilitation at Johns Hopkins University in Baltimore, MD. She is an accomplished researcher, having studied the effects of electrical stimulation on hyolaryngeal movement in healthy and dysphagic adults. Dr. Humbert's current research focuses on swallowing neurophysiology and on Alzheimer's disease.

She was one of the first SLPs in the US to implement a free water protocol, having successfully managed thousands of dysphagia patients on free water since 1984. Jennifer Brush, MA, CCC-SLP, is an internationally published researcher, educator, and long-term care consultant currently in practice in Northeast Ohio. Ms. Brush specializes in geriatric care, rehabilitation programming and interdisciplinary activity development for dementia. Her primary area of research examines interactions between breathing and swallowing in individuals with indwelling tracheostomy tubes, neurologic impairments and respiratory disease.
