Updates On Aphasia Therapy: Selecting The Best Treatment For Patients With Language And Cognitive Disorders

SEMINAR DESCRIPTION

Clinicians working in acute, post-acute, and long-term care settings are faced with the challenge of selecting treatments to improve functional communication for clients with language and cognitive disorders. Until recently, the cognitive abilities of clients with aphasia were rarely taken into account for planning treatment. In this seminar, the most up-to-date scientific evidence will be used to provide a clinical decision-making framework that can guide the clinician's initial evaluation and then treatment selection.

Brief but effective cognitive evaluation for clients with either primarily language disorder (aphasia) or primarily cognitive disorder (brain injury or dementia) will be demonstrated. The results of these brief assessment tools will be entered into the treatment selection framework. The nature of the cognitive impairments can help clinicians select a treatment that is most likely to be effective in improving functional communication. Several evidence-based treatments from which to choose will be described in detail, including procedures and materials. Case examples will be shown to illustrate how to use the framework and the assessment information to select relevant evidence-based treatments. The participant will leave the seminar with a clear framework from which initial evaluation and subsequent treatment sessions can be developed for clients with language and cognitive disorders.

Jacqueline J. Hinckley, PhD, CCC-SLP, BC-NCD, has 20 years of experience treating patients with aphasia and other neurogenic communication disorders, and is known internationally for her work on treatment effectiveness and implementation. Dr. Hinckley is an Associate Professor in the Department of Communication Sciences & Disorders at the University of South Florida. She has a particular interest in integrating the clinician's expertise and the client's values with scientific evidence supporting best practices. She is the author of *Narrative-Based Practice in Speech-Language Pathology: Stories of a Clinical Life.*

Kenneth H. Schatz, MA, CCC-SLP, is a former Associate Professor of Speech-Language Pathology at Eastern Michigan University. Mr. Schatz has over 20 years of experience working with older adults with a variety of disorders, including aphasia, cognitive disorders, and swallowing disorders. Most recently, Mr. Schatz worked in rehabilitation where he developed an expertise in functional communication and swallowing treatment in the long-term care setting.



Bonnie Martin-Harris, **PhD**, **CCC-SLP**, **BRS-S**, is an internationally renowned lecturer, researcher and clinician. She is the Founder and Director of the MUSC Evelyn Trammell Institute for Voice and Swallowing in Charleston, SC. Her latest research project was a rigorous, five-year MBS study testing whether a standard vernacular, protocol, evaluation measurement, and reporting method could be validly and reliably executed for the MBS. This study produced the *Modified Barium Swallowing Impairment Profile (MBSImP)*.



Donna S. Lundy, **PhD**, **CCC-SLP**, **BRS-S**, is an Adjunct Associate Professor and the Co-Director of the *Vocal Disorders Laboratory* within the Miller School of Medicine at the University of Miami, FL. Her clinical practice is focused on the management of individuals with head & neck cancer, swallowing disorders and voice disorders. Dr. Lundy has published more than 30 articles in peer-reviewed journals and authored numerous book chapters. She is involved in a number of multi-institutional research grants investigating swallowing difficulties in head & neck cancer patients. On a national level, Dr. Lundy is on the review board for ASHA Publications/Materials and serves on the Neurolaryngology Subcommittee for the American Academy of Otolaryngology—Head & Neck Surgery.



Paula A. Sullivan, MS, CCC-SLP, BRS-S, is a Speech-Language Pathologist in the Department of Neurology/ Speech Section within the North Florida/South Georgia Veterans Health System in Gainesville, FL. Her clinical expertise and research is focused on swallowing disorders in head and neck cancer and at end of life. Ms. Sullivan has published numerous articles and book chapters, and co-authored books related to these topics.
